DECIDING THE TITLE AND SCOPE

- Title should indicate the scope of the article
- It is preferable to restrict the scope of the article to just one theme. By reading the title the reader should get a clear idea about the scope of the article.
- The title of the article should be crisp and precise. Avoid lengthy titles. Be brief and exact.
- Always use only simple words for the title
- Next slide we will start writing an article

REMINISCENCES OF MY VISIT TO THE RUSSIAN CUSTOMS ACADEMY IN 2014

- The title of the article gives you a clear idea about the scope of the article and what the contents are about.
- Restrict the size of the article to less than 1200 words.

STRUCTURE OF THE ARTICLE

- The 1200 word article should next be properly structured, preferably as follows:
- I. Introduction a glimpse of what the article is about Maximum number of words should be less than 150.
- 2. Opening paragraph Take the reader step by step to read the contents. Restrict to 200 words.
- 3. Main body This can be done in the next two or three small paragraphs, totaling 650 words
- 4. Conclusion Should be emphatic and firm about the final tone of the article. 200 words

LENGTH OF THE ARTICLE

- If the article is being published in newspaper/magazine/college magazine, it is preferable to keep the total number of words between 1200 to 1500 words.
- Some newspapers need article of 3000 words
- Professional journals would need scholarly articles, hence the number of words can range even beyond 5000 words. Proper citation and references would be needed.
- So first decide the length of the article.

OPENING PARAGRAPH

- In the previous slide, in the Introduction paragraph, all details about the scope of the article is there – visit by a training academy official to another training academy, official visit, number of visiting delegates, when was the visit and duration of the visit, and purpose of the visit.
- After the introduction paragraph, there comes the Opening paragraph, which will set out the trend of the article. In the example we give brief outline covering – arrival at Moscow, arrival at the Academy, fascinating landscape

- The main body of the article can be divided into small paragraphs and photographs can be inserted at desired places to make the article reading pleasurable.
- The conclusion of the article should give a clear opinion or conclusion. Make it end on a positive note.
